## Work Performed: 2014

**New London Harbor Light**, located on the west side of the New London harbor entrance, is the seventh oldest U.S. lighthouse, and it is the oldest and the tallest lighthouse in Connecticut, and on Long Island Sound. It is described as a "white, octagonal pyramidal tower [reaching] 90 feet above ground and 89 feet above water".

The light is visible for 15 miles and consists of three white flashes and one red flash. It was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1990. It is currently owned and maintained by the <u>New London Maritime</u> <u>Society</u> as part of the National Historic Lighthouse Preservation Act program.

Restoration of the 213-year-old sandstone and brick lighthouse required removal of unsound portions of previous coatings, sandstone patching and crack repair, limited repointing and stucco replacement and installation of a bright white coating in keeping with the light's continuing service as a navigational aid.
